A Note From the Director, Michael Lamb

As the summer winds down, Suncoast Bronze Ringers is busy working on our music for our Christmas concerts in December. I selected the music in March, and then throughout the spring, assigned parts. This step was finalized in the summer after auditions were done. In August, the ringers get their part assignments and start learning the music in advance of our first rehearsal in September, right after Labor Day. Rehearsals, for us, are mostly to get together to coordinate the sense of ensemble, to put things together, as well as start to establish a group sense of musicality for each piece. So, unlike many school or church groups, ringers don't use rehearsal time to learn their parts, but to move beyond that. Although many of the members don't have access to bells at home, they can still learn their parts. Since they already know most of the techniques they need, a lot of the preliminary work is mental. They study the music, look for problem spots and work out logistically how they will try to handle those areas when they get behind the bells.

That brings up a great point about the intricacies of ringing bells at a more advanced level. Many people think that ringing in an advanced group involves just playing more challenging music. And although that IS part of it, there are many more advanced tools and techniques that are needed in order to handle the advanced music. For example, in less challenging music, playing a key change or an accidental (a sharp, flat or natural not in the key signature) is usually just a case of putting down one bell (say an E natural) and picking up another (like an E flat). But

what if you have a sequence where you have to play Enat-Eb-Enat one after another? You shouldn't shortchange the note value by putting it down early and damping the sound, but you don't want to be late picking up the Eb either. So, this is when creative techniques are needed. Things like using "4 in hand" (pick up the Eb with a hand that is holding another bell), or sometimes asking your neighbor to help out. There are LOTS of different things we do, that happens many, many times throughout a concert, for every ringer.

So the challenge, of course, is to come up with a plan for the tricky parts, then master doing it when the music is flying by very quickly, all the while playing smoothly and musically. Oh, and make it seem effortless to the audience! As with any musical instrument, handbells are a constant learning experience and no matter how long you've played, there is always room to improve: new techniques, and ways to approach the music. So, as you are watching the concert, concentrate on 1 or 2 of the ringers and watch how they handle some of those more intricate parts. You'll probably notice some of those tricky spots I am talking about!

Our Christmas concert this year is very exciting. We have a good mix (as usual) of traditional and popular tunes, older arrangements and newer takes on things. We have a surprise opening that you'll love and an ending that will knock your socks off. In between, we have 2 of the most profound and beautiful Christmas pieces ever arranged for bells with Betty Garee's 'God With Us For All Time (Veni Emmanuel)' and 'Stille Nacht (Silent Night)'. These were written back in the 80's and are as stunning today as they were back then. We also have a new Latin-style arrangement of 'Hark! The Herald Angels Sing' by Cathy Moklebust and the ever-popular but extremely difficult TSO piece 'Wizards in Winter' arranged by Hart Morris. So again, a fantastic way to get you into the holiday

spirit in early December and I hope to see you and all your friends and relatives there! Keep an eye on our website for ticket information. Some of the venues will probably sell out fast!

Inside the Music

Our 2021 Christmas Concert, once again has a wide variety of music, including some audience favorites from past years. The centerpiece of the concert is a pair of stunning arrangement of Veni Emmanuel and Silent Night, by one of the pioneers in the handbell world, Betty Garee. We have included 'God With Us for All Time' which features the tune to O Come, Emmanuel with 'Stille Nacht' to give a truly otherworldly feel to the middle of our 2021 Ring Noel concert. Starting with the chiming of the quarter hour, 'God With Us' takes us musically through the build up to midnight on Christmas Eve, by guiding us along a pensive and thoughtful landscape and then leading us to a momentous culmination at the top of the hour. There is no doubt in anyone's mind what is happening at this point and the musical mastery of the writing of this iconic piece is one that our audience will not forget.

Following that high point to the Christmas event, we experience the tranquility and peace that 'Stille Nacht' provides in a stunningly beautiful setting. Although it's not long and is very simplistic in its presentation, the genius of Betty Garee is on full display in the complexity of interaction between the different textures and harmonies.
